# CULTURAL DIPLOMACY: heritage science as a bridge for dialogue











## PROGRAM

The activities that CNR, through the **Institute of Heritage Science** (ISPC), has been carrying out for a long time in various countries of the world have a strong scientific and cultural value.

In addition to the archaeological missions in the national territory, the bilateral projects, the training activities, and the temporary mobility programs aimed at acquiring skills in the field of Heritage Science, it is abroad that CNR ISPC fully expresses its soft power: cultural diplomacy directly related to **science diplomacy**. With its 56 projects, more than half of which are supported by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation, CNR ISPC is widely present in 21 European and non-European countries.

Cultural Diplomacy thus becomes the expression of an interdisciplinary approach to support the knowledge, protection and enhancement of different territories and different peoples, and in some circumstances, also in favor of Peace. Indeed, by sharing and exchanging ideas, values, languages, and practices related to intangible heritage, CNR ISPC researchers foster the promotion of dialogue, respect for diversity and mutual understanding between peoples and nations, in support of a broader action of political and economic cooperation at the international level.

Today we are increasingly oriented towards a logic of strategic, methodological, and social co-creation, characterised by the application of collaborative and community approaches to research, musicalisation and the enhancement of Unesco and non-Unesco sites, as well as to management and development of socio-economic plans of the territories.

But how can all these goals be achieved? What asset does the CNR put at our disposal? What skills are needed? And what are the critical issues in the organisational chain of a scientific and cultural diplomacy activity?

The projects and activities of CNR ISPC will answer all the above questions while offering a current and analytical panorama for the theme of "Peace and Scientific Diplomacy" giving an explicit vision of what Cultural Diplomacy in our intentions is.

All of this, supported by an **online and on-site multimedia application**, will be presented through **a Conference to carry out a transversal analysis aimed at joint debate** starting from the bilateral projects, the archaeological laboratories and all those activities which fall under the umbrella of "third mission" for public engagement and know-how transfer in Cultural Heritage, scientific and cultural cooperation.

10:15 Session 1 "Knowledge: declination of a concept"

The search for fundamental scientific results for the advancement of knowledge has long been confronted with the presumed cultural hegemony of the Western world, the notion of progress and the narratives of ancient societies as parameters for judging other cultures. Today, the new forms of knowledge from the past are increasingly inclusive and participatory in ISPC international projects: consolidated methods and innovative technologies allow for a genuine sharing of approaches, themes and procedures with our fellow researchers and university professors, often co-directors of missions. The concerted actions with the countries in which ISPC operates aim at creating a system based on new paradigms through the contamination of knowledge, ideas, and cultural diversity while sharing the scientific method. The comparison is active on several fronts, not only in the study of the modern and ancient landscape of sites and monuments but also in the process that from knowledge leads to the fruition and sustainable development of the material and immaterial Cultural Heritage, which represents the memory and the identity of the countries in which ISPC works.

Session 4 "Young generations: training, involvement, exchanges"

Training as a tool for dialogue and cooperation between people and different countries represents one of the primary forms of Cultural Diplomacy, which ISPC continuously takes care of. In the context of planning and international training programs, ISPC has pursued innovative approaches for promoting knowledge, conservation, and enhancement of Cultural Heritage. Thanks to an open (two-way learning) and interdisciplinary approach, the Institute has directed its actions towards various levels of users. From institutional capacity building to the training of scholars of different age groups and levels, up to the broader public, through the promotion of experiences of social participation in the various countries involved. All of that, through summer schools in both Italian and foreign contexts, workshops, and bilateral exchanges of ISPC personnel. Finally, the active participation of local communities was valued as a crucial moment for sharing and exchanging knowledge. The debate and analysis of issues related to the concepts of knowledge, conservation and enhancement of Cultural Heritage must necessarily be shaped in the light of local knowledge. In this sense, public engagement represents a strategic action by ISPC to establish and strengthen stable relations of dialogue and collaboration with civil society, pursuing the development of new skills, the acquisition of values, the improvement of research purposes and the promotion of forms of co-planning.

Session 5 "Diplomacy and archaeology: the results of ISPC international projects and the collaboration with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation "

The CNR and ISPC in particular, have numerous agreements with foreign institutions, which for the archaeological field take the form of bilateral projects, the so-called joint archaeological laboratories, and projects co-financed by the MAECI-Archaeology Sector.

In this session, the results of these agreements and activities will be presented above all from the point of view of institutional relations with the countries involved, with a particular focus on scientific-academic relations, on legislative issues in the broadest sense and on social results for local communities involved.

Two foreign scholars who have been scholarship holders at ISPC will attend the session. They will talk about how the period spent at ISPC was beneficial to their professional careers, particularly for diplomatic relations between the respective countries. The conclusions will outline the prospects of ISPC scientific-diplomatic activity, also following the lines dictated by other Italian institutions involved.
